

To name few measures taken in 2020


- Working with electronic documentation to limit personal interactions

- Changing and adapting working hours and schedules to operate in this new reality as it will last a good portion of 2021









A New Context in 2020





- Freight volumes contract by 11% in the U.S.
- The COVID-19 economic slowdown will cause GDP to fall by around 4% in the U.S.(first decline since 2009) and by 6.6% in Canada (source: Conference Board of Canada).
- Industrial production in the U.S. and Canada has declined by 7.3% and 12.7%, respectively, year-over-year in September.
 - The outlook is for industrial production to transition to recovery in the first half of 2021 (subject to whether there are widespread business shutdowns due to the second wave).
 - U.S. and Canadian steel production are at their lowest levels in over 10 years and down nearly 15% from this time last year.



COVID-19 changed consumer's patterns

North American **automotive industry** slowed down in March to an almost complete halt in April 2020.

Pressuring the iron ore volume to decrease as steel mills shut down in the U.S.


Car Production in United States in 2020



COVID-19 affected our Energy Sector

We notice a sudden decline in coal handling imports. The energy sector was hit hard with the manufacturing plants closing due to COVID outbreak and demand decrease in North America.

The exports sectors showed a significant decline from record high 2018 of 16 million short tons per quarter to 9 million in the second quarter of 2020.

Canadian grain elevators are dealing with record volumes in 2020

- All economic drivers related to transportation are down except for the agricultural sector: manufacturing (-8.5%), mining (-12.4%), imports (-19%), and exports (-20%).
- All transport modes are touched by the slowdown
 - Trucks (-9%), rail (-20%), water (-19%)
 - 2021 forecast is for transportation volumes to rebound by 5.3% and the long term is a 2.8% CAGR between 2020 and 2031 (source: IHS Markit, Freight Transportation Forecast).





Sugar demand increased sharply this year bringing record tonnages to the Canadian refineries.

Road de-icing salt imports volume slowed down this year. The tonnage handled was mostly domestic salt by self-unloader vessels.





CONCLUSION

- COVID-19 has brought challenges to our industry. We adapted our operations to this new reality and will continue to put effort forward to protect our employees as they are our greatest assets.
- We have seen many changes in our operational practices, automatization and artificial intelligence are key to reduce company exposure to risk.
